She noticed a crack on one glass.




The rim of another glass was chipped.

The steam moistened the glass.




She placed the wet glass on a clean cloth in one hand...



...and inserted the edge of the cloth into the glass with the other hand.




She rotated the glass until it was polished and sparkling.

...the base of each glass overlapped the next...




...and took them to the table.


For Special Attention


- *chipped* [glass or crockery] a glass or plate etc. which has a small piece broken off from its edge or rim
- cracked [glass etc.] a glass etc. that shows a line along which it has broken. The item is still in one piece.
- broken [glass etc.] the item is damaged and in pieces
- *lint* = dust-like bits of fabric that cloth sometimes leaves on glasses
- water spot = a stain that water sometimes makes when it dries on a surface
- *lipstick stain* = a stain on a glass made when someone wearing lipstick drinks from the glass
- discard bin a container for broken, chipped or cracked items
- lined service tray = a tray that has a clean cloth on it
- face down = upside down
- rotate = turn something in a circular direction


